



Earn a Master of Public Health (MPH) degree from UMHB while you complete your TCU medical degree.

The Burnett School of Medicine at TCU and the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor Public Health Program have partnered to develop an integrated path to the Master of Public Health (MPH) degree for interested medical students without extending the time to completion of their medical degree. The course prescription and integration plan maximizes student learning and growth during both degree programs. The MPH with a Health Promotion concentration requires 33 graduate credit hours in addition to the TCU MD curriculum.

This unique opportunity allows medical students to transfer 9 credit hours from the Burnett School of Medicine courses to fulfill the 42 credit hour MPH degree. The recommended course integration provides students the opportunity

to receive both the MD and MPH degrees at the same time, in May of Year 4. The public health courses at UMHB align with the Council on Education for Public Health (CEPH) criteria, as well as address the Certified Health Education Specialist (CHES®) core areas of responsibility, which are defined by the National Commission for Health Education Credentialing, Inc. (NCHEC).
